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BRIEF REPORT OF APDWA PARTICIPATION IN THE PRIMARY COURSE OF THE PROGRAM FOR GLOBAL HUMAN RESOURCE DEVELOPMENT FOR PEACEBUILDING AND DEVELOPMENT

Acting for Peace, Development and Well-being for All (APDWA) is grateful to the Japan Ministry of Foreign Affairs (MOFA) and to the Hiroshima Peacebuilders Center for the opportunity to participate, through our National Executive Director, Mr. Aquilas Koko Ngomo, in the Program for Global Human Resource Development for Peacebuilding and Development (Global Peacebuilders Program) in January-February, in Japan.

II. OVERVIEW OF THE PROGRAM

The Program for Global Human Resource Development for Peacebuilding and Development (Global Peacebuilders Program) is established by the Ministry of Foreign Affairs of Japan (MOFA) in order to strengthen civilian capacity for peacebuilding and development. The Hiroshima Peacebuilders Center (HPC), commissioned by MOFA, implements the program in cooperation with the United Nations Volunteers (UNV) programme.

The Primary Course is designed for people who have the strong will to build their careers in the field of peacebuilding and development to acquire the required practical knowledge and skills through participation in a 5-week Coursework in Japan. The aim of the Coursework is to master a high-level of knowledge of peacebuilding and development. Through workshops, the participants learn to apply the acquired knowledge to practice and to develop practical skills in the field of peacebuilding and development.

The following three policies are the core pillars for management of the Course focused on human resource development for peacebuilding and development of practitioners.

Firstly, the Primary Course aims to develop practical knowledge and skills of the participants. In accordance with the Program's objective to develop experts in the fields of peacebuilding and development, the Coursework provides necessary knowledge, skills and experiences relevant to policy issues and other practical work in these fields.

Secondly, the Primary Course is designed to develop the "Competencies" of the participants. These Competencies are skills that are crucial in working for the United Nations and other

international organizations. For example, exercising leadership effectively in a multinational team is highly regarded by international organizations and it is well-considered during the application process. The Coursework is designed in such a way that the participants will consciously improve the relevant Competencies.

Lastly, the Primary Course provides a valuable opportunity to build networks with experienced lecturers, practitioners and graduates of the Program, many of whom are Japanese nationals engaged in peacebuilding and development.

In addition to Japanese nationals, for the 2024 Cohort (JFY2023), the participants in the Course came from 10 countries/organisations: the Republic of Mali, the Democratic Republic of the Congo, the Republic of South Sudan, the Republic of Kenya, Republic of Lebanon, the Republic of Haiti, Ukraine, the Solomon Islands, the Philippines, and the African Union Commission (AUC).

The Democratic Republic of the Congo (DRC) was represented by Mr. Aquilas Koko Ngomo, National Executive Director of Acting for Peace, Development and Well-being for All (APDW).

With the aim to improve its work and increase positive impact at local and national levels, APDWA would like to use the new skills from the training to:


- Strengthen the capacities of its staff on relevant topics related to peacebuilding, development and humanitarian aid;
